Federal Land Management Agency partners: Bureau of Indian Affairs and Tribal Governments, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Defense, National Park Service, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, USDA Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

- In addition to those agencies -
 - The <u>Eastern Federal Lands Highway Division</u> works hand in hand with towns and cities in New Hampshire to ensure highways and bridges are built correctly, inspected regularly, and maintained. Federal lands must be reachable through properly designed and constructed roads and bridges, but the natural beauty of the area must be maintained.
 - Appalachian Trail Corridor 160.9 miles and rises from 400 to 6,288 feet in elevation. The Appalachian Trail is managed by the National Park Service and the U.S. Forest Service on a federal level. State agencies, volunteers, and the non-profit Appalachian Trail Conservancy also work to keep the trails in good condition.
 - <u>Lake Umbagog National Wildlife Refuge</u> spreads across northern New Hampshire and into Maine. The refuge allows boating, fishing, hiking, and hunting. It's also available for camping if visitors reserve a shoreline campsite in advance from the State of New Hampshire.
 - Saint-Gaudens National Historic Site 175 of the 370-acre site. Managed and maintained by the National Park Service.
 - Silvio O. Conte National Wildlife Refuge stretches 7.2 million acres along the Connecticut River. Ct, Ma, Vt, and NH all have portions of this refuge. The NH sections include Blueberry Swamp (1,023 acres), Mascoma River (761 acres), and Pondicherry (6,405 acres) and is managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
 - White Mountain National Forest This federally owned land covers close to 800,000 acres in New Hampshire and Maine. The USDA Forest Service manages this national forest.
